Thirty years ago the Asociacion Filatelica de Filipinas was organized. It was on May 10, 1925. Since its organization, it has done its best to protect and promote the interests of our avocation.

Like many organizations, it behooves us the Asociacion Filatelica de Filipinas had its small beginnings. It was organized by a small group of individuals interested in stamp collecting. And that was

exactly three decades ago.

In the early years of our Association, it has experienced several trials and tribulations. Despite these difficulties, however, it has weathered them all. Most noteworthy to observe the A.F.F. has survived thru four different political regimes of the Philippines—the American administration, the Commonwealth transition, the Japanese occupation, and the present Republic. And so, from 1925 to 1955, it has gradually risen into prominence and became the fore-

most organization of stamp collectors in the Philippines.

There's no gainsaying the Asociacion Filatelica de Filipinas is the oldest existing society of philatelists in this country. After three decades, by qualifications and experience, it's now an institution itself. Gifted with these qualities, the A.F.F. has pioneered and supported several national philatelic activities redounding to the commonweal of our hobby. Most outstanding among them there was the PHICIPEX in 1954—Philippine Centenary International Philatelic Exhibition—whereby the A.F.F. as one of the sponsors, brought it to a successful conclusion. Our Association was fortunate indeed to have witnessed and participated at the PHICIPEX, the greatest stamp show ever held in this country in observance of the Philippine stamp centennial. Then, too, there were the FEPEX in 1937 and the PANAPEX in 1952 two other major exhibitions of great philatelic importance whereby the A.F.F. has also participated and supported.

Completing its 30th year in organized philately, the Asociacion Filatelica de Filipinas has published this Yearbook, embodying wholly two specialized Catalogs. They are the Catalog of G. I. Postal Slogans and the Catalog of Philippine Postal Slogans, two outstanding contributions to Philippine philatelic literature, written by Don Jesus Cacho and Pablo M. Esperidion, respectively, two prominent

members of our Association.

Treating exclusively on local postal slogans—a specialized phase of Philippine postal history—publications of these two catalogs as undertaken by the A.F.F. was keenly felt by the growing need for a ready reference of students and collectors of this interesting branch

of our postal history.

Published mainly for reference purposes, it will be observed, however, prices or market value of the postal slogans listed in these two catalogs have been entirely disregarded. The reason for this simple: the Asociacion Filatelica de Filipinas is not a dealer in stamps and allied subjects. Neither it's a trade organization. Obviously and as a matter of policy, the A.F.F. does not deal and is definitely not in the stamp trade. In advancing this logic, the A.F.F. therefore leaves the matter of prices to the criterion of the interested parties. It is hoped that these two catalogs which are being released on the occasion of the 30th Anniversary of the A.F.F., will serve the purpose for which they have been published.

Thirty years of life in organized philately is full of significance, and the Asociacion Filatelica de Filipinas in completing its 30th Anniversary, shall look forward to many more happy anniversaries

in the years to come.

CENTENNIAL STAMPS OF THE PHILIPPINES













DESIGN of the centennial stamp issued by the Bureau of Posts in honor of the centenary of the first postage stamps of the Philippines is illustrated above. Motif shows an exact replica of the Stamp No. 1 of the Philippines, the 5 cuartos orange portraying a profile of an effigy of Queen Isabela II issued on February 1, 1854 or 100 years ago. This design is superimposed on a background depicting on the left, the Landing of Magellan in the Philippines on March 16, 1521. On the right is a picture of a Filipina in native dress holding the Philippine flag. At the rear, a mail carrier is seen and part of the Bureau of Posts Building, above of which is a modern airplane flying... This centennial commemorative was printed in bi-color and was issued in two series, namely, postage and airmail. Particulars of the stamps are: Postage, 5c purple—5,000,000; 18c green—1,000,000; and 30c blue—500,000. Airmail, 10c dark brown—1,000,000; 20c dark olive-1,000,000; and 50c red-500,000. Their sizes are 40 x 29.5 mm. Vignette of the stamps, however, is printed in orange-brown, while the background in basic colors as indicated above for each denomination. Wording of the stamps reads: "PHILIPPINES" in the upper part of the design, and "POST-AGE" and "CENTAVOS" are inset each in a rectangle, left and right, respectively, at the base of the design. Between the boxed "POSTAGE" and "CENTAVOS" the years "1854-1954" are indicated. The denomination for each stamp is superimposed on the word "CENTAVOS." For the airmail series, however, instead of "POSTAGE," the word "AIR MAIL" is indicated... Printing was done by Thomas de la Rue & Co. Ltd., London. First day issue of the stamps was on April 25, 1954, at the opening day of the Philippine Centenary International Philatelic Exhibition (PHICIPEX), in Manila,

Report of the President

The year 1954 for its significance in our philatelic world will be remembered for a long time.

It saw the one hundredth anniversary of the first postage stamp issued in the Philippines.

The activities of the Club to commemorate this event, with its attendance planning and execution kept every member busy, and as many collectors participated in the exhibition, made those days quite exceptional.

The stamps commemorating the Centennial are very attractive; the design, made it one of the outstanding issues so far, and the printing is superb. It is only after the exhibition is over that one can pass judgment over its success or shortcomings, but taking it as a whole, it was well carried out and the various committees did a splendid work; we all profited by the experience.

As for the activities of the Asociacion Filatelica de Filipinas in/the coming year, first on the list will be to celebrate its 30th anniversary; this can be done without any formal exhibition; by some other activity that the new Board of Directors may think of, and to be announced at the proper time.

It is of interest to every member to know in detail the indefatigable efforts and uncompromising stand your Club took with regard the controversial issue whether or not the stamps returned from the Washington Agency were to be sold to the public or were to be burned. The resolution made by your Club and forwarded to the proper authorities is printed in full at the end of this report as it reflects clearly the views of the Directors, and also of the great majority of its members.

The Asociacion Filatelica de Filipinas has always stood for the highest ideals in philately; that it must be well guarded at all times against any misconception or misrepresentation. With this sound principle in mind it has fearlessly fought any erroneous fallacy, with the full knowledge that bitter criticism would come from those of different opinion. Perhaps it is by these high standards advocated and followed that the Asociacion Filatelica de Filipinas has withstood so successfully the many battles fought and won in the past.

Although it is the same problem that affects all the clubs throughout the world, attendance to meetings is very much neglected. It is hoped that members will realize that these meetings are essential to the life of the Club and also educational for the members; it is the one time when members having the same collecting interest can compare notes, as it were and exchange views

and share some "finds" they have made. It will keep their interest alive and make the Club come to life; suggestions can be made and future activities can be put into effect.

A Board of Directors is elected to carry out the wishes of the members, in so far as it is practicable.

What better place or a more appreciative audience can one ask for, when giving out a bit of news about an issue or a stamp, or recounting some interesting experience?

Much of the fun in collecting comes from telling other collectors the way your collection grows, how the stamps are mounted, and showing an album of complete sets, or bewailing about an incomplete set, or how hard it is to secure such and such stamp, or about the price of a specimen one does not have, and hundreds of other topics.

It is true that one could visit each other individually; but most of us do not have the time to do so except on Sundays, and we cannot visit more than two or three people. In Club meetings you meet many people at one time, who, like you, are collectors and interested in stamps and in swapping tales.

If collectors would only realize this, every meeting of our Club would be crowded, every member would attend, and if every one would tell something about some experience he had, or give a talk, interesting, instructive, we would all profit.

Your Club is open to suggestions; suggestions that are practical; suggestions that are in the interest of all the members; suggestions that are easy to carry out. Meetings and activities are the life of a Club, and your Club wants to live.

Suggestions offered, can then be discussed and something tangible, some new activity, some untried idea may come out for the benefit of all, and for the benefit of your Club.

A few words about the Slogan Catalogs published in this Yearbook.

Work of this nature cannot be accomplished overnight. It requires endless research and even after all the notes are arranged, a small detail will come up and the work must be revised again.

Additions and corrections will come up perhaps after collectors here and abroad start checking each item. It is only by this means that one can hope to achieve a certain amount of accuracy, and in time it is hoped that these catalogs will serve as the recognized reference to the numerous collectors who are beginning to collect postal slogans and slogan cancellations and that this phase of philately will have as many followers as collecting stamps.

Subject: Proposed Resale of Demonetized Pre War Stamps

Forwarded herewith is a copy of the resolution as approved by the Board of Directors of the Asociacion Filatelica de Filipinas, manifesting the opposition of this Association as to the petition of a group of individuals regarding the resale of the demonetized prewar stamps by the Bureau of Posts to the stamp collecting public, the said stamps with a total face value of about P150,000.00.

Supporting our opposition to the resale of the stamps in question, we are giving hereunder the following reasons:

- 1) Sale of these stamps will affect adversely the standard and good prestige of our stamps in the philatelic world, for the simple reason that destruction of said stamps is a fait accompli by virtue of the standing postal ruling which went into effect since 1946. Accordingly, its resale will create a big scandal.
- 2) If and when, the proposed resale is made, it will be condemned by the stamp world and thus create a very unsavory and critical public opinion especially in organized philately and in the philatelic press of the world. As a case in point, we are quoting hereunder some excerpts from an editorial of the "India Stamp Journal," Bombay, in its May 1954 issue, reading as follows:
 - "... Mr. H. L. Jerath, the Director-General of Posts, recently announced at a press conference that his department possessed over Rs. 50,000,000 worth of old demonetized and obsolete Indian and Indian States' stamps, and therefore, he was thinking of selling them in the stamp market and thus collect the much needed cash for his department... If Mr. Jerath, or any other postal official of the Government of India is permitted to carry out the sale of these remainders, we unhesitatingly warn that India's name will sink into the gutters of the stamp world forever... We have made the last effort to save India's name from sinking into the gutters of the world... because India's good name is worth much more than a few lakhs of rupees to be realized from demonetized stamps which no self-respecting and civilized country ever indulges in now-adays."

- 3) Philippine stamps have earned a good prestige abroad for a long time and they are highly regarded by collectors especially specialists on Philippine issues. Naturally, we hate to see such prestige destroyed, by the sale of the demonetized stamps in question.
- 4) In the event the proposed sale is considered, in all likelihood the Bureau of Posts will be confronted with a big problem; the problem of distribution, i. e., the manner in which the stamps will be sold to the stamp collecting public. Whether by the sets or by a quota, we feel it would create disappointments to collectors and criticisms towards our postal authorities and to the Bureau of Posts at large.
- 5) We doubt very much if all the stamps in question could be sold at its estimated face value of ₱150,000.00, considering the fact that the most coveted issues are the 4-peso small "Commonwealth" overprint and the 20¢ and 60¢ Moro Vinta airmail of 1941 with an estimated maximum face value of about ₱10,000.00 only. With this insignificant amount, shall we sacrifice the good prestige of our stamps in the stamp world?
- 6) Experience of some countries, especially in South America, has shown in the past that their attempts to sell their demonetized stamps to the stamp collecting public had met with catastrophic results, and as a consequence of which, the stamps of such countries have lost their good standing in the philatelic world—a sad and bitter experience which we do not want and never wish to happen to the stamps of the Philippines.

In view of the reasons as set forth above, we therefore reiterate our strong opposition to the proposed sale of the demonetized prewar stamps, and let us keep and maintain the good prestige of the stamps of the Philippines to its high level as it has enjoyed and continues to enjoy in the stamp world.

I believe integrity, respect, and reputation are worth more than money. —ERNEST A. KEHR, Stamp News Editor, New York Herald-Tribune. RESOLUTION OF THE ASOCIACION FILATELICA DE FILI-PINAS OPPOSING THE PETITION OF A GROUP OF IN-DIVIDUALS PROPOSING THE RESALE OF DEMONETIZED PREWAR STAMPS.

WHEREAS, The General Auditing Office issued an order for the destruction or burning of all prewar stamps for having been demonetized, and in compliance with such order, all prewar stamps from all provincial postoffices and other postal stations were recalled and destroyed;

WHEREAS, after the destruction of all prewar stamps found in the Philippines was accomplished, the Philippine Philatelic Agency in Washington, D. C., returned all prewar stamps to the Manila Post Office for destruction with a total face value of about P150,000.00;

WHEREAS, after the receipt of said stamps, a group of individuals presented a petition to the Bureau of Posts proposing the salvage of said stamps and the resale of same to the stamp collectors;

WHEREAS, to accede to the petition for the resale of said demonetized stamps, it would be looked upon disfavorably by the philatelic world, and consequently the loss of prestige of our stamps;

WHEREAS, even disregarding the opinion of the rest of the world, the distribution of said stamps to collectors would surely not satisfy every one and thus cause more criticism and scandal;

WHEREAS, the Asociacion Filatelica de Filipinas, the oldest national organization of stamp collectors in the Philippines, organized in the interest of philately and stamp collectors in this country since the past twenty-nine (29) years and as such, this Association is always vigilant in protecting and maintaining the good prestige of Philippine stamps and philately;

RESOLVED therefore as it is hereby resolved that the Asociacion Filatelica de Filipinas urges that the general order for the destruction of said demonetized prewar stamps by the Bur-

eau of Posts be complied with for the reasons as advanced in a letter addressed by the Association to the Director of Posts and which letter is an annex to this resolution.

RESOLVED FURTHER that a copy of this resolution be transmitted to the Director of Posts, Manila.

PHILIPPINE POSTAL SLOGANS

Pablo M. Esperidion

Introduction

In times of peace or in times of war, postal slogans are used by the Bureau of Posts. Used mainly for psychological purposes, they stir the enthusiasm of the people. Postally they are mere postal markings, but philatelically, they are part and parcel of Philippine postal history. As such they are worth collecting and studying.

As one who specializes on postal slogans of the Philippines, I have made a study of this specialty, as a result of which I have incorporated them in this catalog. Of course, this does not attempt to be complete as there might be some items in existence which, at the time of its preparation, I have neither seen them nor they have come to my knowledge. At any rate, practically all the basic materials referred to in this catalog are from my personal collection, and it is hoped the information imparted herein will be of some interest to my fellow collectors.

Categories of Slogans

Classifying the postal slogans of the Philippines, I have grouped them under the following categories: 1) Official; 2) Semi-Official; and 3) Commercial.

Postal slogans and/or postal slogan cancellations as used by the Bureau of Posts, are considered as "Official." Those used by other government departments or bureaus, are designated as "Semi-Official." Under this same category, those used by the U.S. Navy (slogan cancels on Philippine waters) in the prewar days and by the GIs during the early months of the liberation, are designated likewise. And postal slogans used by private firms or individuals, are identified as "Commercial".

Before going further into this catalog, let it be said that it will treat exclusively on the postal slogans and/or slogans cancellations which have been used only by the Bureau of Posts, i.e., those coming only under the category of "Official." The reason for this is obvious. Just as postage stamp adhesives are issued officially by the Bureau of Posts, in a manner of speaking, the subject postal slogans and/or slogan cancels are "issued" likewise by the Bureau of Posts, officially. Having been used officially by the Bureau of Posts,

they are therefore part and parcel of Philippine postal history. Thus their exclusive treatment in this catalog.

Types of Slogans

Used mostly by the Manila Post Office for half of a century, the "official" postal slogans are identified philatelically under the following types:

- Doremus
- 2) Flags
- 3) Straightline
- 4) Universal
- 5) Boxed
- 6) Fancy.

Postal slogans of the foregoing types have been applied by machine and/or by handstamp. Too, they are postal slogan cancellations and/or just plain postal slogans.

Under the machine slogan cancels, there are the Doremus, Flags, Universal and Boxed. And under the handstamp types, there are the Straightline and the Fancy. Of the Boxed slogans, however, some of them were applied by handstamp and some by machine.

Doremus Types

Forerunner of the machine cancellations and slogan machine cancels in the Philippines, is the Doremus. This machine cancel has several types. However, only two types were used by the Manila Post Office. They were introduced in this country in 1908 and 1909.

Bearing 18 vertical bars, the Doremus slogan cancellation is like the keyboard of a piano. Hence, its designation, Doremus (from the musical notes — Do, Re, Mi). This type of cancelling machine was manufactured by the Doremus Cancelling Machine Co., Washington, D.C.

Earliest known Doremus slogan cancel in the Philippines was dated "Oct. 15, 1908." Legend of its slogan reads: "PHILIPPINE CARNIVAL—MANILA, FEB. 2-9, 1909," all in capital letters in two lines. It was applied in black.

Flag Types

Next to the Doremus, there came the Flag machine cancellations. As far as collectors are concerned, there are three major types of the Flag cancels. They are known as the Ovate, Involute and Spread Star Field. Still, under these three major types, there are the specific types.

They are the following:

- 1) Ovate Star Field
- 2) Spread Star Field
- 3) Boxed Slogan
- 4) Backstamp
- 5) Station Cancel
- 6) Exposition Cancel
- Battleship Slogan
- 8) Naval Station Cancel.

These specific types, however, were not all used in the Philippines. Only the 2nd, 3rd, 4th, 6th and 7th types were utilized. Wholly they were used by the Manila Post Office but the 7th type which was used by the U.S. Navy, in Cavite.

Because there are no available records, the exact date as to when the first Flag machine cancel was used in the Philippines is not known. At any rate, earliest Flag cancel seen was dated "Dec. 30, 1916." It was a Spread Star Field. Motif of this cancel is an American flag. It has 13 stars spread in the field and seven wavy stripes on the right. In the Union it has a staff and a halyard. Used in 1916, this type of Flag cancel was also used in the ensuing years, untill 1923. This is as far as I have seen.

Bearing a slogan in the field, is the Boxed type. Like the Spread Star Field, it has also a staff and a halyard, plus the usual seven wavy stripes. The earliest date seen of this Flag slogan cancel bears "April 7, 1917." And the legend of the slogan reads: "ARE YOU HELPING—IF NOT, WHY NOT?—BUY A—LIBERTY BOND," all in caps in four lines. It was applied in black. While this Boxed slogan cancel was used in 1918, at least five other slogan cancels of the same type were used in the same year.

Prolifically used by the Manila Post Office during the closing years of the First World War up to the 20's, the Flag slogan cancels of the Boxed type, are known to exist with at least 24 different slogan cancels. This is as far as I have seen in the study of this particular machine slogan cancellation.

All Flag slogan cancels of the Philippines were applied by machine and used by the Manila Post Office. Then, too, they were applied in black. Notwithstanding this, however, one of them

was done by handstamp and it was applied in purple. It was used by the post office of Capiz, Capiz, and the earliest date seen was "Dec. 3, 1925."

Use of the Flag machine cancels and/or slogan cancellations was continued by the Manila Post Office for almost ten years. The latest was in 1926. Then, it was discontinued. All in all, at least there were 30 different kinds of the Flag types which were used in the Philippines.

Straightline Types with Grids

During the last three years of use of the Flag slogan cancels, it's interesting to observe that the Manila Post Office utilized at the same time, at least three different Straightline slogan cancels. They were applied by handstamp but of steel die. Besides this, each has a grid. It's a "barrel-killer." Still, each "barrel-killer" has a different type. The largest is with five heavy horizontal bars, the longest measuring 2 x 3 centimeters. And height of this stamp "killer" is 3.7 centimeters. Earliest date seen of this Straightline slogan cancel was "Aug. 14, 1924", with the slogan reading: "REGISTER-INSURE -ALL-VALUABLE-MAIL," all in caps sans serifs in five lines. It has a circular townmark with a single frame.

The second type of this Straightline slogan cancel was also used by the Manila Post Office. Its slogan reads: "MANILA—TRADE—CENTER—OF THE—PACIFIC," all in caps sans serifs in five lines. Earliest date seen was "July 3, 1925." Its "barrel-killer," however, is smaller than the first, but its townmark is exactly the same as the former.

Third type of the Straightline slogan cancels bears the wording: "MANILA, P. I. - (Date) - (Time) - (Year)-ADDRESS MAIL - TO - STREET AND — NUMBER," all in caps sans serifs in eight lines. Earliest date seen was April 7/25. It has also a "barrel killer," but it's the smallest of the three types of grids. As it appears, this third type is a combined townmark and slogan cancel. And while it was used by the Manila Post Office, it was used likewise by the Cebu Post Office. But in this case, instead of "MANILA, P. I." as its point of origin in the townmark, "CEBU, P. I." is indicated. Earliest date seen of this type as used in Cebu was "Sept. 23, 1925." And the latest date I have seen was "Feb. 23, 1933."

Straightline Types in Native

For the first time in the postal history of the Philippines, the Bureau of Posts, in 1927, set into use a series of postal slogans in native dialects. Applied by handstamp, they were utilized during a campaign for national thrift. Postally, they were called the "thrift slogans." However, they are not slogan cancels. They are just plain postal slogans. Neither they are boxed nor framed. They come in two or more inscriptions, in simple straightlines.

Notwithstanding their simplicity, yet they are quite interesting. What makes them interesting are their legends. They are in native dialects. Some of them as far as I could gather, are in the following dialects—Tagalog, Ilocano, Bicolano, Pampango and Visayan. In addition to this, there were some in English. Then, too, some were in English and Tagalog, combined.

Where these postal slogans in native dialects had been used, as far as I have seen them on covers, there were those from Manila, Lucena (Tayabas now Quezon), Sta. Cruz (Laguna), Lobo (Batangas), Calapan (Mindoro), Laoag (Ilocos Norte), Legaspi (Albay), Rapu-Rapu (Albay), Surigao (Surigao) etc. They were applied by handstamp in red, but some were in purple.

Earliest date seen of these "thrift slogans" was "July 3, 1927." The slogan was in Tagalog. Its wording reads: "ABANGAN ANG MASIGLANG PAGSISIKAP SA PAGTITIPID," all in caps in two lines, the break in the first line appearing in the division of "PAG" and "SISIKAP" by a hyphen. This slogan was used by the Manila Post Office. It was applied in red.

While use of this series of postal slogans in native dialects was first seen as early as in July 1927, at least they saw postal service for one and a half year. Latest date I have seen was "Dec. 21, 1928."

Far from being relevant to the series of the "thrift slogans," in 1928, there appeared another provincial postal slogan. In essence, it was an exposition handstamp straightline. Its point of origin was San Pablo, Laguna. And inscription of the slogan is: "SAN PABLO CARNIVAL — AND — LAGUNA PROVINCIAL FAIR—April 11-16-17, 1928," in three lines, the first and second all in caps but the third in caps and in lower cases. Earliest date seen of this type was "Mar. 12, 1928." Townmark in black but the slogan in purple.

Straightline Types-Occupation

Fifteen years after the first series of the "thrift slogans" was discarded, the Bureau of Posts used again another series. This time it was in 1943, incidentally, during the Jap Occupation. And at that time, the Bureau of Posts was changed to "Bureau of Communications."

Of the Occupation series which was used exclusively by the Manila Post Office, there were only three slogans of different types. And like their predecessors, they were handstamp likewise. But, unlike the first series used in 1927 and 1928 which was in several native dialects, the second series used in 1943, was all in English. At the outset, this

Wording of the slogans are as follows:

- "POSTAL SAVINGS BANK—Deposit your savings—with the local—postmaster."
- "POSTAL SAVINGS BANK— Thrift takes you up—the ladder, waste brings you down."
- "POSTAL SAVINGS BANK—He that will not economize, will have to—agonize."

Each of the above slogans is in four lines, the first line all in capital letters and underlined. The rest are in caps and lower cases. Used by the Manila Post Office, they saw postal service for about three months.

Straightline Type-Guerrilla

It's interesting to note, while the Occupation "thrift slogans" were being used by the Manila Post Office, the guerilla government of the "Free Philippines" functioning somewhere in Mindanao was also using a postal slogan with the inscription reading: "WE DEPEND UPON—GEN. MacARTHUR—PLEDGE TO RETURN."

This guerrilla postal slogan is in three lines and all in capital letters. Boxed in a rectangle, its size is 1.9 x 3.8 centimeters. It was applied by handstamp in purple. Earliest date seen of this guerrilla slogan was "Dec. 23, 1943."

Straightline Type-Liberation

Close on the heels of the liberation of Manila early in February 1945 and with the mopping operations of the U.S. Armed Forces still going on in the Philippines, the Manila Post Office on May 1, 1945, put into use a Straightline postal slogan with the legend. "LABOR DAY—CALLING ON ALL

LABORERS—HELPYOUR COUNTRY—SECURE EMPLOYMENT WITH U.S. ARMY—FOR ESSENTIAL WAR WORK," all in caps in five lines. This slogan was applied by rubber-stamp in purple. It was used for one day only, coincident with the Labor Day and the First Day Sale of the 8¢, 1-P and 20¢ special delivery stamp of the "Victory" regular postage series.

Universal Types

The first Universal machine slogan cancel was introduced in the Philippines in 1930. It bears the legend, 'MANILA - TRADE CENTER OF THE—PACIFIC," all in capital letters sans serifs in four lines. According to the Bureau of Posts, this machine slogan cancel was used by the Manila Post Office, the first day use being, "July 12, 1930." Boxed in a rectangle, its size is 1.9 x 5.5 centimeters, the rectangle measuring 1.9 x 3.3 cm. plus seven straight lines on the right, each line 2.8 cm. long and open at the end. It has a steel die or dial commonly known as the "Universal". Main characteristic of this dial is: the name of the town or city (Manila) is shown on top, the date in the center, and the name of the state or country (P.I. or Philip-pines) is indicated at the bottom inside the dial. This is distinguished from dial of the Doremus machine slogan cancels mentioned in this catalog before. Dial of the Doremus shows the town or city (Manila) and state or country (P.I.) on top but the year at the bottom in the die. This type of dial is known as the "American."

Since the introduction of the Universal machine slogan cancels in the Philippines, it's interesting to observe at least 36 different types were utilized. Twenty-seven of them were used by the Manila Post Office, five by the Cebu Post Office, and one by the U.N. Navy in Cavite. Out of the 27 different types used by the Manila Post Office, however, two of them were plain boxed slogan cancels, i.e., without the usual seven straight lines used as "Killers."

Likewise it's interesting to observe, some of these slogan cancels as used by the Manila Post Office, were also used as "backstamps." This was especially true in the late 30's. True enough, their use as such was also witnessed until the outbreak of the Pacific War. Then, too, since the Republic up to the present, some postal slogan are being used as backstamps. Obviously, it's an established postal precedent.

The Universal machine slogan cancels were used by the Manila Post Office for several years. Some of them went into use for eleven years until the outbreak of the Pacific War. When the Jap Occupation came, however, their use was discarded but one. It was the slogan cancel bearing the legend, "POST -YOUR MAIL-EARLY," in caps in three lines. It's First Day Use during the Occupation was on March 4, 1942. It was an occasion of the First Day Sale of the first provisional issues of the Philippines (2¢ and 16¢ postage stamps and 2¢ postal card), released during the early months of the Occupation. Use of this slogan cancel lasted for three years until the last days of the Jap Occupation of Manila. Latest date seen was Feb. 3, 1945, the same day the U.S. Armed Forces liberated Manila.

Among the Universal machine slogan cancels used in the Philippines, I believe the slogan cancel, "POST YOUR MAIL EARLY" as described above, is the most historical. Its historical significance lies in the fact not that it was used for 14 consecutive years (1931–1945) and bears the longest record of service, but it saw postal service in three different regimes of the Philippines, namely, the American Administration, the Commonwealth transition, and the Jap Occupation. Considering this fact, in the postal history of the Philippines, therefore, it deserves a niche to remember by.

Types of Machine Dials

In discussing the machine slogan cancels of the Universal type, mention of the dials of these cancels should also be made. Dials of the Universal type used in 1930 to 1945 have two types. So with the box enclosing the slogans. The dial used in 1939 bears the inscription "MANILA" on top and "PHILIPPINES" at the bottom in the dial. The type used prior and after 1939, has "MANILA" on top but "P.I." instead of "PHILIPPINES" at the bottom. The same dial used in 1939 is also used at present by Manila Post Office on its machine cancel but without any slogan.

As to the box of the slogans, at least each of them has two types: one without any break in the frame, and the other with two breaks on the vertical frame on the left. In the addition to this, there are also some varieties in the size of the box. Also in the types of the letters of the slogans.

Boxed Types-Handstamp

Prolifically used during the present Republic, are the slogan cancels of the Boxed type. All of them are handstamps. Introduction of the Boxed slogan cancels, however, was seen not during the present Republic. Long before World War II, the first slogan cancel of this type was introduced by the Manila Post Office. It was late in 1921. Apparently it was 20 years before the last World War.

Worthy to note, it was also the first postal slogan cancel of the Philippines in which the slogan comes before the townmark. It has a legend reading: "JOIN THE—RED—CROSS," all caps with serifs in three lines with a cross in heavy bars between the words "RED" and "CROSS". This inscription is boxed in a rectangle, 1 x 3.3 cm., and the townmark has a frame in double circle, 3.4 cm. in diameter. Applied by handstamp in black, earliest date seen of this forerunner of the boxed slogan cancels of the Philippines, was "Nov. 5, 1921."

Another pre-war boxed handstamp slogan used by the Bureau of Posts, was in 1930. It was used on the occasion of the 300th anniversary of the College of San Juan de Letran. The Manila Post Office was the user. Boxed in a rectangle and applied in purple, wording of the slogan reads: "SAN JUAN DE LETRAN — CENTENNIAL — DEC. 18-21, 1930," all in caps in three lines. Earliest date seen was "Nov. 11, 1930."

In addition to the two pre-war slogan cancels of the Boxed type as described before, another postal slogan of the Boxed type was used in 1937. It was used in Iloilo, Iloilo. Enclosed in a rectangle of 2 x 5.7 cm. with a wavy frame, its inscription is: "INAUGURATION—CITY OF ILOILO—JULY 16, 1937," all in caps in three lines. It was applied by handstamp in purple. This postal slogan, however, was not a slogan cancel. It was a plain postal slogan. In other words, it was used separately from the townmark. Earliest date seen on a commercial cover was "July 16, 1937." In all likelihood, it was used by the Iloilo Post Office for one day only, in connection with the inauguration of the City of Iloilo.

Single-Letter Slogan Cancel

The honor of having used the first slogan cancel of the Philippines after the Second World War, goes to the post office of Fabrica, in Negros Occidental. It was used early in 1946, and applied by handstamp in black. It's unboxed. But, unlike the standard slogan cancellations, it has no inscription at all, except a big letter "V", meas-

uring 2 x 22 cm. The letter "V", in this instance, stands for "Victory." It's interesting to note, similar slogan cancels were used in the United States, England, and Canada during the hectic years of World War II.

Prominently displayed in the center, the letter "V" in the subject slogan cancel, is supported by five straight horizontal lines on both sides of the letter. Earliest date seen of this forerunner of the postwar slogan cancels of the Philippines was "Mar. 25, 1946."

First Boxed Type-Republic

Enlisting as the first boxed slogan cancel of the Republic of the Philippines was the slogan used by the Manila Post Office in October 1946. It has a legend, reading: "HELP THE—PHILIPPINE RED CROSS," all in caps in three lines, with the ensignia of the Red Cross, in the second line. While this slogan cancel was applied by handstamp in black, its existence in purple as well as in purple black, is also known. Thus, as far as its color is concerned, at least it has three types.

First Day Use of this slogan cancel was on October 28, 1946. Last day was on Nov. 28, 1946. Evidently, it was exactly one month. Its use, however, was not only as a slogan cancel, but also as a "backstamp." And as a backstamp, it was applied only on domestic air mail letters.

Boxed Types-Purely Philatelic

What may be considered as purely philatelic in legend, are the two slogan cancels used by the Manila Post Office in October, 1947. One of them bears the slogan, "COLLECTING STAMPS—IS EDUCATIONAL &—CULTURAL HOBBY." The other is: "COLLECT STAMPS—BE A STAMP—COLLECTOR NOW." Both of which are all in caps sans serifs in three lines.

First Day Use of both slogans was on October 19, 1947. It was on the occasion of the "Ladies Day" of the Philippine Philatelic Club, Manila. Last day use was on October 25, 1947. Both slogan cancels were also used as backstamps on interisland air mail received at the Manila Post Office.

Another slogan cancel used by the Manila Post Office and purely philatelic in its legend saw postal service in April 1948. Its slogan reads: "COLLECT STAMPS—ORGANIZE A—STAMP CLUB IN—YOUR COMMUNITY," all in caps sans serifs in four lines.

April 16, 1948, was its First Day Use. May 15, 1948, was the last day. Too, it was used as a backstamp on local air mail letters received at the Manila Post Office.

Fancy Types

In no history of philatelic Philippines, Fancy slogan cancels have been so extremely used since the past three years. Fancy as they are and conveying the logic of the slogans at random, they easily arrest one's attention and prove interesting. Doubly interesting, the Bureau of Posts has been using these Fancy slogan cancels, not only on occasions of national significance but also for some events of international scope worthy of commemorating.

Among the interesting of the Fancy types, there are those used for the "UNAC" (March 16/48); "Aviations Week," (Dec. 12/48); "Long Live The Republic" (July 4/49); "Jaycee International World Congress" (Type I, Aug. 1/49 and Type II, Aug. 16/49); "Education Week" (Sept. 12/49); "Community Chest" (Dec. 16/49); "Liberation Day Agricultural School" (Feb. 7/50); "First Anniversary Manila Lions Club" (Mar. 23/50; and the "Fish Conservation Day" (Oct. 22/50), etc.

In addition to this, there are also the two different types of postal slogans of the Philatelic Division of the Bureau of Posts, used expressly for philatelic promotion. One of them was used early in October 1948 and the other was used early in 1949. The former was applied in green and the latter in purple. In design and legend, both are invitations to the ubiquitous hobby of stamp collecting.

As A Specialty

Building a collection of postal slogans of the Philippines, one will find it an interesting field. Mere acquisition of the postal slogans, either on entires or in cut-squares, does not stop there. Sooner or later, one will go further and eventually make research and study them. Consequently, in the study of this specialty, . one will discover, not only the different types of postal slogans, but also their major and minor varieties, errors and freaks, designs and formats, and the significance of their legends according to our times. Thus, it's a wide and varied field, and as such, it offers a rich field for philatelic research.

Making a summary of the postal slogans of the Philippines since their introduction in 1908 and their continuous use up to the present or within a period of 46 years, at least, there are 237 different postal slogans and/or slogan cancellations which have been used by the Bureau of Posts. To collect and study them, is certainly a specialty, and as a specialty, it's one of the interesting phases of Philippine postal history.

CHRONOLOGY

To enable collectors of Philippine postal slogans to have a ready reference of this specialty, I have prepared a Chronology listing these postal slogans accordingly. This Chronology is from Oct. 15, 1908 to Dec. 31, 1954, covering a period of 46 years, in which 237 postal slogans, at least, were used by the Bureau of Posts. Particulars of each slogan are hereby also given, following each legend. Unless otherwise stated, all slogans included in this Chronology are machine slogan cancels and were applied in black and used by the Manila Post Office only. Dates of First Day Use as indicated are as per official records of the Bureau of Posts.



1) "PHILIPPINE CARNIVAL—MANILA, FEB. 2-9, 1909." Doremus type. Slogan in two lines. Earliest date seen, Oct. 15, 1908. Also used in 1909.



2) "PHILIPPINE CARNIVAL—MANILA. FEB. 5-14, 1910." Doremus type. Slogan in two lines. Earliest date seen, Dec. 2, 1909. Also used in 1910.



3) "PHILIPPINE CARNIVAL—MANILA, JAN. 30 - FEB. 7, 1915." American Machine Cancel. Slogan in two lines. Earliest date seen, Jan. 8, 1915.



4) DESIGN bears an American flag with 13 stars in the field. Flag type—Spread Star Field. Earliest date seen, Nov. 6, 1916. Used until 1923.



5) "ARE YOU HELPING—IF NOT, WHY NOT?—BUY A—LIB-ERTY BOND." Flag—Boxed type. Slogan in 4 lines. Earliest date seen, April 7, 1917. Also used in 1918.



6) "DO YOUR BIT IF NOT—WHY NOT." Flag—Boxed type. Slogan in 3 lines. Earliest date seen. March 23, 1918.



7) "EVERY LITTLE HELPS—BUY WAR—SAVINGS STAMPS." Flag—Boxed type. Slogan in three lines. Earliest date seen, June 13, 1918.



8) "WIN THE WAR—BY RAIS-ING—MORE FOOD CROPS." Flag— Boxed type. Slogan in 3 lines. Earliest date seen, Sept. 9, 1918.



9) "BUY A BOND" (with design of a bell in center of legend). Flag—Boxed type. Slogan in 3 lines. Earliest date seen, Sept. 15, 1918.



10) "FOOD WILL WIN THE WAR—DON'T WASTE IT." Flag—Boxed type. Slogan in two lines. Earliest date seen, Sept. 17, 1918.





Summary

Based on the foregoing chronology it's apparent that about 237 postal slogans and/or slogan cancellations have been used from 1908 to 1954 or within a period of 46 years. Distribution of these slogans as used in different political governments of the Philippines reveals—

71 slogans (Nos. 1-71), Oct. 8, 1908 to November 1, 1935 or 27 years—American Administration.

16 slogans (Nos. 72-87), January 5, 1936 to November 18, 1941 or 5 years—Commonwealth Government.

5 slogans Nos. 88-92), March 4, 1942 to February 3, 1945 or 3 years—Japanese Occupation.

1 slogan (No. 93), in 1943 or 1 year—Guerrilla (Free Philippines).

2 slogans (Nos. 94-95), May 1, 1945 to March 6, 1946 or 2 years—Liberation.

142 slogans (Nos. 96-237), October 28, 1946 to December 18, 1954 or 8 years—present Republic of the Philippines.

G. I. POSTAL SLOGANS

V-J Day was the end of World War II. It brought great joy to the free world. But not to many GIs, especially those stationed in the Philippines. At the termination of the war, GIs who saw action and had been stationed for quite a long time in this country, began drumming to go home, back to old U.S.A. And who doesn't want to go home after all the blood and thunder one has experienced in different theaters of war operations?... The GIs were right. There's no place like home!

But the clamor of the GIs seemed to be unheeded by the military high command. The reason advanced, there were no sufficient available ships to transport the soldiers back to the United States. And so, GIs long overdue to go home had to standby at replacement camps. Their standby was indefinite subject to available bottoms. But the GIs

didn't like this. They wanted to go home, and quick! But whether they liked it or not, there was the postwar military red-tape.

Because of this military red-tape, the GIs enlisted the use of postal slogans. Used on the mails posted at different Army Post Offices or APOs, the postal slogans vociferous drummed the demand of the GIs. And here started the beginning of the GI postal slogans in war-torn Philippines.

Sparkling with wit and humor, the GI postal slogans were used from 1945 to January 1946. This was especially observed during the election year—the election for president—Truman vs. Dewey. Thus taking advantage of the election year, most of the slogans carried the legends as illustrated here and enumerated in the following check list:—

These slogans, however, were not slogan cancels, but plain postal slogans, used at different APOs as stated before.

Taking into account that these postal slogans had been used in the Philippines, I believe they are also worth collecting, especially for a collection of Philippine postal history or postal markings. With this belief, therefore, I have tried to build a collection of these postal slogans, and as far as I have gathered, there are more than 110 different types in all.

In order to appreciate more these GI postal slogans, they are illustrated with this article. The illustrations are in their original sizes from my personal collection. It is hoped, collectors of Philippine postal markings will find these GI postal slogans interesting and enjoy collecting them as I have experienced.
